

Preamble

Dear Reader,

As you embark on your journey with Ella through the Marvellian world, try to imagine it as one that exists right beside the one you've known your entire life. The mysteries and magic you will encounter here are a manifestation of humankind's quest for understanding and desire to build bridges between forces seen and unseen. Since time immemorial, societies have tried to make sense of mysteries in the world all around us. These most often showed up in educational systems as studies centered around mythological tales and creation stories. In many schools today, young people still learn about Greek and Roman mythology, but they seldom venture beyond to explore what is referred to as metaphysics, or beliefs people have that pertain to the spiritual world throughout our global society.

Here is your opportunity to explore magical places, creatures, foods, and practices through the eyes of all people of the world. You will travel to places in the Americas alongside Ella and be able to think about and discuss some of their magical histories. If you are lucky enough to live in New Orleans, New York, or any of the other places in the story, take this guide as your opportunity to explore more of what makes these places so special in the world of those who feel connected to magical traditions. You may find yourself wondering if what is presented is fact or fiction.

As is the case with any fantastic tale, you will find real places and people woven in alongside those Dhonielle Clayton has created for the purposes of making space for the imagination in a world where creativity really does create. Consider this book an invitation to read, discuss, and explore the magical communities that are all around us, the cultural ties that bind us, and the biases that if we are not careful, can tear us apart. So, let yourself become part of world creation by reading this story and integrating it into what you know or believe you understand about the world we live in.

Central Themes

- 1. Community The Marvellian world exists beside the world of the "Fewels" and that of the Conjurers. Each has very specific rules for members of the community. Consider the ways that communities are formed and how individuals are encouraged to change themselves to fit in with the rules of their community.
- **2. Exclusion vs. Inclusion -** At times throughout the story, Ella feels excluded due to her Conjurer heritage. This parallels the way many people have been excluded or judged based on the communities they come from. Examine the ways societies have historically treated those who are different and have stigmatized specific groups of people.
- 3. Conflict and Community As Ella encounters the Ace of Anarchy, she also must examine the questions she has about her own upbringing and place at The Arcanum Institute and in the Marvellian world. She ultimately has to decide how she will handle conflict in her community and how she can use her abilities to fuel the pursuit of justice. Discuss the way humans have handled conflict in our society and individuals like Gandhi, MLK Jr., Benazir Bhutto, or Malala who have had the ability to help us navigate conflict, and change the course of history through their words and actions.
- 4. Global Magic The Marvellers contains many areas of global magical knowledge. Some of it is ancestral knowledge that has been passed down through generations. Though magic has a very imaginary place in the Western world, this is not true everywhere. For some, the "Underworld" or the spiritual world of those who no longer live among us, for example, is very real and as much alive as the one we inhabit every day. Discuss magical traditions through time you may have heard of or experienced and allow the story to support a deeper exploration of them.

- 3. How is Ella different from those around her?
- 4. What kind of pets do you have? How are they similar to or different from the Conjurer's companions?
- 5. What does Ella want more than anything? Why?
- 6. According to The Conjure Edict, where are most conjurers from?
- 7. How does Marvellian magic compare to what you know about magic in your culture/society?
- 8. Which of the items on Ella's packing list interests you the most? Write a description of what it is/does. How do her items compare to what you would pack to go on a trip?
- 9. What was the first Conjure Ella ever did? What can you infer about her gifts from this?
- 10. What are the Marveller tenants? Do you have any comparable rules or social contracts in your society?
- 11. Anansi is a very important figure from West African, African-American, and Caribbean folklore. Have you heard of him before? If so, what do you know? If not, where could you find more information about him?
- 12. What are the Paragons? What do they control?
- 13. Who were the founders of the Arcanum Training Institute and what do their names tell you about what they believe in?
- 14. What do you notice about Ella's schedule? How is it similar to or different from yours? Which class do you think you'd like to take the most?
- 15. Why is Ella so resistant to Jason's offers for help? What can you infer about her character by the fact she doesn't like to accept help so easily?
- 16. What's the significance of a bottle tree? Are there any plants or trees with magical or spiritual properties in your culture? If so, what are they?

- 34. What is the "Marvellian Way"? Why do you think Ella is being targeted?
- 35. What do you think about Ella's godmother's advice that "What's done in the dark doesn't stay there for long"?

- 2. Have you ever communicated with someone you're close to just through your dreams or thoughts? If so, what was it like? Describe the dream or incident using as much detail as possible.
- 3. Think about the world we live in and people who live between cultures, races, languages, and ethnic groups. What might it mean to be a "bittersweet cross between rage and hope, but yet still full of love"? Can you relate to this? If not, what are some things you could do to become more empathetic and enlightened?
- 4. Who do you think is bullying Ella about her light and why? Have you ever been bullied about talents you have, or because you didn't have talents you wish that you did? Or have you ever witnessed someone being bullied before? Write about the incident in as much detail as you can.
- 5. In your opinion, what are some reasons people look to the stars for predictions about their fate? Do you know your astrological sign? Do you think it matters? Why or why not?
- 6. What are some injustices or inconsistencies you notice about how people are treated in the world of the Marvellers? What injustices exist in our world that are similar? Ex. Those from certain regions of the country, a city, or a state, are often treated differently or as less than.
- 7. What do you think of Ella's mama's words, "Some things have to be faced. They can't be avoided." (347) How do they compare to James Baldwin's words, "Not everything that is faced can be changed, but nothing can be changed until it is faced." Write a journal prompt exploring both quotes and their underlying ideas and how they connect to the story in *The Marvellers*.
- 8. How do you think you would react if you knew you had to face someone like Gia? What special skills would you use, or people would you call to help you?




Other Activities

- 1. Create a body biography for any character indicating their thoughts (mind) feelings (heart) actions (hands) and desires (belly). Add their companion if they have one. Google images will have many examples, but here is one example of a Body Biography.
- 2. Create a set of tenets or code of conduct for students at your school or in your classroom community. What are some rules or social understandings you all agree to abide by? Create a poster or banner with these tenets and post them in a place where they will be seen by all. Why do we need to have tenets or rules of conduct? What makes it so hard for a community to determine what rules to follow?
- 3. The Marvellian World is held together by families and friendships. As such, you will find the names of many authors mentioned in the book that are part of the family of folks who write literature. How many of them do you know? What books of theirs have you read? You may want to set aside a space in your classroom or create a Jamboard with book covers that show their titles so you have more stories to explore. Here are a few of their names:


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
- 6. Complete this <u>Character Development Reading Log</u> for a character of your choice to track their development throughout the story. How do the characters change? Write a narrative with text evidence or create an annotated image or visual presentation using ThingLink or Animoto to describe the changes your chosen character undergoes throughout the novel.
- 7. Conjure marks are external signs of internal beliefs/power and they're not so different from tattoos that many people have in cultures around the world. Conduct some research about the art of tattooing in a specific country and culture around the world. Then, prepare a presentation to explain any typical types of tattoos, any commonly found symbols or language, and the actual process of getting a tattoo, whether it be ancient, or modern. If you choose, you may interview someone you know who has a tattoo of special significance. Take pictures of their tattoo and record their answers to questions you ask and add their information to your presentation.
- 8. Research the Transatlantic Slave Trade and the routes that slave ships took. How did traditions of conjuring travel from the African continent to locations of the African diaspora including the Americas and the Caribbean? Here are some resources to help you with your research.

If you choose, you may research a depiction of The Underworld that is specific to a global culture and draw that instead. Include as much detail as you can and be sure to include any creatures or individuals known to inhabit the realm.
- 11. Draw a picture of a world-hatching egg. Explain each element of what owners will find when the egg hatches.
- 12. Research some Non-western constellation systems. What types of stories do they reveal about beliefs about how the world works? Do you have a preference for any? Why or why not?





- 15. Write your own short story with the central characters from The Marvellers. Where will they go, what will they do, and who will accompany them? Remember to use <u>Freytag's Plot Pyramid</u> to include all appropriate parts of the story.
- 16. What do the Starfolk look like? What do you think Conjure companions, Rotties, Pixies, or Dirt Dobbins look like? *Use clues from the book to illustrate one.
- 17. Using what you know of the Hero's cycle, map out Ella's adventures and connect each part of her story to a stage in the cycle. You may choose the traditional cycle found, or a feminist version both of which are discussed here.
